



Topic: Finding Hope in Immanuel

Pray:

Meditate:

Read

Isaiah 7:14: "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel."

Isaiah 9:6-7a: "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end."

In the book of Isaiah, we encounter a predicament faced by the house of David. They receive news that the nations of Aram and Ephraim have allied against them, causing fear and unrest to consume the hearts of King Ahaz and his people. It is at this crucial moment that God speaks through the prophet Isaiah, offering a promise that will provide assurance and hope.

The promise is given in Isaiah 7:14, where the Lord declares that He Himself will give a sign: a virgin will conceive and bear a son, and He will be called Immanuel, which means "God with us." This profound statement encapsulates two crucial aspects of God's nature: transcendence and immanence.

Transcendence refers to the fact that God is above and beyond us, existing apart from His creation. He is not confined to time or space; rather, He is the eternal, unchanging source of all things. The promise of Immanuel reminds us that God, in His transcendence, chooses to enter into the brokenness and chaos of our world. He lovingly chooses to be present with us, comforting and guiding us through difficult times.

Immanence, on the other hand, speaks to the nearness and presence of God within us and among us. Immanuel, meaning "God with us," reveals to us that God chose to take on human form through Jesus Christ. Through His incarnation, He dwells among us, experiencing the joys and sorrows of human life. This is a profound mystery - the divine becoming human, bridging the gap between the land of the divine and the land of the mortal.

Furthermore, the promise of Immanuel assures us of an everlasting kingdom. In Isaiah 9:6-7a, we are given a glimpse into the future reign of the Messianic King, who will establish a government characterized by justice and righteousness. This kingdom will have no end, and the zeal of the Lord Almighty will bring it to pass. The assurance of an eternal kingdom offers hope in the midst of uncertainty and chaos. It reminds us that despite the trials and tribulations we face in this world, there is a greater reality awaiting us.

As we reflect on the promise of Immanuel, let us find comfort and assurance in the realization that God is with us. May we ponder the mystery of the transcendent God choosing to dwell among us, sharing in our human experience. And may we hold steadfast to the hope of an everlasting kingdom, trusting in the zeal of the Lord Almighty to accomplish His purposes.

Proclaim:

Let us proclaim this truth: We serve a God who is both transcendent and immanent. He is the Creator of the universe, yet He chooses to be intimately present in our lives. Immanuel, "God with us," is not a distant concept but a reality we can experience daily. As we journey through life's challenges, let us declare that God is with us, guiding, comforting, and sustaining us. And let us eagerly await the fulfillment of His promise—a kingdom of justice and righteousness that will have no end.
