# **Topic: Follow Me - New Priorities**

# **Opening Prayer:**

"Search me, O God, and know my heart! Try me and know my thoughts! And see if there be any grievous way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting!" (Psalm 139:23-24). Lord, search our hearts and help us to lay down anything that keeps us from fully following You. In Jesus' Name, Amen.

#### Read: Matthew 16:24

In Matthew 16:24, Jesus lays out a challenging path for those who would follow Him: "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." This invitation, spoken directly to His disciples, highlights the depth of commitment Jesus calls us to—one that involves a complete reordering of our priorities. To "deny oneself" and "take up his cross" was a radical call in Jesus' day, and it remains radical today. It signals a move away from self-centered living to a life that embraces sacrifice and surrender.

The phrase "take up his cross" in this context is profound. To the disciples, the cross symbolizes death and shame. Yet Jesus was redefining the meaning of the cross, calling His followers to see it as a sign of dedication, of embracing God's will over personal comfort. Here, Jesus emphasizes that following Him means setting aside our own agendas, comforts, and even our identities for the sake of His kingdom.

For us, "taking up the cross" might not mean physical suffering, but it certainly involves daily choices that prioritize God's purpose over our own desires. It's about letting go of our plans, trusting that what Jesus offers in return—life with Him—is far greater than anything we could pursue on our own. This daily act of surrender involves trading our own wants for His will and trusting Him to reshape our lives to reflect His purpose. Our priorities shift as we realize that a life centered on Jesus is richer, more meaningful, and eternally valuable.

#### Conclusion:

Choosing to follow Jesus means embracing His call to put aside self-interest, take on the mindset of a servant, and live each day with a kingdom-first perspective. As we commit to this path, we find that our lives are transformed—no longer centered on us but on Him. This is where true purpose and fulfillment are found.
